ORDINANCE NO. 272 - 1998

BY: COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND ANNEXATION COMMITTEE

TITLE: AN ORDINANCE authorizing and directing the Mayor to enter into an agreement with Weight Watchers Gourmet Foods, DBA Heinz Frozen Foods Company, in cooperation with Americold Logistics, Inc., providing for the adoption of a project which will expand a facility and create employment opportunities in the City of Massillon, Ohio, and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, the City of Massillon has encouraged the development of real property and the acquisition of personal property located in the area designated as an Enterprise Zone; and

WHEREAS, Weight Watchers Gourmet Foods is desirous of expanding a facility within the Enterprise Zone through the expansion of its production and warehouse operations at 1301 Oberlin Road, S.W., a total investment of \$26,000,000, to establish a "Center of Excellence for Frozen Foods" at the existing Weight Watchers site and that will result in the creation of 109 new permanent full-time jobs; and

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Massillon, Ohio (hereinafter "Council") by Ordinance No. 163-1994, adopted July 18, 1994, and as amended by Ordinance No. 57-1998, adopted March 2, 1998, has designated an area of the City as an "Enterprise Zone" pursuant to Chapter 5709 of the Ohio Revised Code; and

WHEREAS, effective September 12, 1994, and as amended on March 13, 1998, the Director of Development of the State of Ohio has determined that the aforementioned area designated in said Ordinance No. 163 - 1994, and as amended by Ordinance No. 57-1998, contains the characteristics set forth in 5709.61(A) of the Ohio Revised Code, and has certified said area as an Enterprise Zone under Chapter 5709; and

WHEREAS, the City of Massillon, having the appropriate authority for the stated type of project, is desirous of providing Weight Watchers Gourmet Foods with the incentives available for development of the Project in the said Enterprise Zone, under Chapter 5709 of the Ohio Revised Code; and

WHEREAS, Weight Watchers Gourmet Foods has submitted a proposed agreement application, herein attached as Exhibit A, to the City of Massillon, Ohio, requesting that the incentives available for development with the Enterprise Zone be approved for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor of the City of Massillon, Ohio, has investigated the Application submitted by Weight Watchers Gourmet Foods, and has recommended approval of the same to Council on the basis that the enterprises are qualified by financial responsibility and business experience to create and preserve employment opportunities in said Enterprise Zone and to improve the economic climate of the City of Massillon,

WHEREAS, the project site as proposed by Weight Watchers Gourmet Foods is located in the Massillon City School District and the Board of Education of said district and any applicable Joint Vocational School District have been notified in accordance with Section 5709.83 and been given a copy of the Application;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MASSILLON, STATE OF OHIO, THAT:

Section 1:

The Council of the City of Massillon, Ohio, does hereby authorize and direct the Mayor to enter into an agreement, attached hereto as Exhibit "A" with the Weight Watchers Gourmet Foods, DBA Heinz Frozen Foods Company in cooperation with Americold Logistics, Inc., providing for the adoption of a project which will expand a facility and create employment opportunities within the City of Massillon Enterprise Zone.

Section 2:

This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the health, safety, and welfare of the City of Massillon, Ohio, and for the further reason that approval of said agreement is necessary so as to maximize the investment that will be made by Weight Watchers Gourmet Foods, within the City of Massillon, Ohio. Provided it receives the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the elected members to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

OHIO ENTERPRISE ZONE AGREEMENT

This Agreement made and entered into by and between the City of Massillon,
Ohio, a municipal corporation, with its main offices located at One James Duncan Plaza,
Massillon, Ohio 44646 (hereinafter referred to as "City of Massillon"), Weight Watchers
Gourmet Foods DBA Heinz Frozen Foods Company, a Pennsylvania Corporation with its
main offices located at USX Tower, P.O. Box 57, Pittsburgh, PA 15230-0057,
(hererinafter referred to as "Heinz"), and Americold Logistics, Inc., a
Corporation, with its main offices located at
(hererinafter referred to as "Americold").

WITNESSETH:

Whereas, the City of Massillon has encouraged the development of real property and the acquisition of personal property located in the area designated as an Enterprise Zone; and

Whereas, Heinz is desirous of expanding a facility within the Enterprise Zone through the construction, by Americold, of a new one hundred sixty-four thousand (164,000) square foot warehouse adjacent to the existing Weight Watchers/Heinz production facility located at 1301 Oberlin Road, S.W., resulting in a significant expansion of production and warehouse operations at this site, (hereinafter referred to as the "Project"), provided that the appropriate development incentives are available to support the economic viability of said Project; and

Whereas, the Council of the City of Massillon, Ohio (hereinafter "Council") by Ordinance No. 163-1994, adopted on July 18, 1994, and as amended by Ordinance No. 57-1998, adopted on March 2, 1998, has designated an area of the City as an "Enterprise Zone" pursuant to Chapter 5709 of the Ohio Revised Code; and

Whereas, effective September 12, 1994, and as amended on March 13, 1998, the Director of Development of the State of Ohio has determined that the aforementioned area designated in said Ordinance No. 163-1994, and as amended by Ordinance No. 57-1998, contains the characteristics set forth in 5709.61 (A) of the Ohio Revised Code, and has certified said area as an Enterprise Zone under Chapter 5709; and

Whereas, the City of Massillon, having the appropriate authority for the stated type of project, is desirous of providing Heinz and Americold with the incentives available for development of the Project in the said Enterprise Zone, under Chapter 5709 of the Ohio Revised Code; and

Whereas, Heinz and Americold have submitted a proposed agreement application, herein attached as Exhibit A, (hereinafter referred to as the "Application") to the City of Massillon, Ohio, requesting that the incentives available for development within the Enterprise Zone be approved for the Project; and

Whereas, Heinz has remitted the required state application fee of \$500.00 made payable to the Ohio Department of Development with the application fee to be forwarded with the final agreement; and

Whereas, the Mayor of the City of Massillon, Ohio, has investigated the Application submitted by Heinz and Americold, and has recommended approval of the same to the Council on the basis that Heinz and Americold are qualified by financial responsibility and business experience to create and preserve employment opportunities in said Enterprise Zone and to improve the economic climate of the City of Massillon; and

Whereas, the project site is located in the Massillon City School District and the Board of Education of said district and any applicable Joint Vocational School District have been notified in accordance with Section 5709.83 and been given a copy of the Application; and

Whereas, pursuant to Section 5709.62(C) and in conformance with the format required under Section 5709.631 of the Ohio Revised Code, the parties hereto desire to set forth their agreement with respect to matters hereinafter contained.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained and the benefit to be derived by the parties from the execution hereof, the parties herein agree as follows:

Section 1:

Heinz and Americold shall construct and equip a new one hundred sixty-four thousand (164,000) square foot warehouse facility adjacent to the existing Weight Watchers Gourmet Foods/Heinz Frozen Foods production facilities located at 1301 Oberlin Avenue, S.W. Said facility shall be constructed on an _____ acre parcel of land, known as and being Out Lot _____, in the City of Massillon, Stark County, Ohio.

The Project will-involve a total investment of (\$26,083,333) Twenty-Six Million Eighty-Three Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-Three Dollars, plus or minus 10%, at the proposed project site, further described as follows:

(\$16,000,000) Sixteen Million Dollars, to be invested by Americold, for construction of the new warehouse.

(\$1,000,000) One Million Dollars, to be invested by Heinz, for the purchase and installation of first used machinery and equipment.

(\$9,083,333) Nine Million Eighty-Three Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-Three Dollars, to be invested by Heinz, for new inventory.

The Project does not involve the relocation of any existing machinery and equipment to the project site.

Heinz has reported that its existing base level of inventory	as listed in the personal

The Project will begin on January, 1999, and all acquisition, construction, and installation will be completed by December 31, 2001.

The total investment of this expansion project is greater than 10% of the market value of the facility assets already owned at the site prior to such expenditures as evidenced in Exhibit "A"; and as such, the new facility represents a significant new investment on behalf of the enterprise. For this reason, the City of Massillon hereby determines that the Project is eligible for the tax incentives and other benefits as described in this Agreement.

If, at any time, Heinz and/or Americold determines that it will not undertake all the improvements set forth in this Section I, or otherwise desires to modify the Project, the enterprises will notify the City of Massillon, stating the reasons for its determination. The parties will thereupon confer to discuss the effect of the enterprise's determination on the tax exemptions provided herein and to amend or terminate this Agreement accordingly. In no event shall any such amendment operate to revoke retroactively the tax exemptions provided herein.

Section 2:

Heinz shall create within a time period not exceeding 36 months after the commencement of construction of the aforesaid facility, the equivalent of 81 new full-time permanent job opportunities.

Heinz's schedule for hiring is as follows: create ____ new full-time permanent jobs in year one; create ____ new full-time permanent jobs in year two; and create ____ new full-time permanent jobs in year three. The job creation period begins in 1999 and all jobs will be in place by December 31, 2001.

Heinz currently has 749 full-time permanent employees at the project site. In total, Heinz has 749 full-time permanent employees in the State of Ohio

The increase in the number of employees will result in approximately (\$2,401,000) Two Million Four Hundred One Thousand Dollars of additional annual payroll for Heinz. As stated above, all new jobs created will be full-time permanent jobs.

Section 3:

Americald shall create within a time period not exceeding 36 months after the commencement of construction of the aforesaid facility, the equivalent of 28 new full-time permanent job opportunities.

Americold's schedule for hiring is as follows: create	new full-time
permanent jobs in year one; create new full-time permanen	t jobs in year two; and
create new full-time permanent jobs in year three. The job c	reation period begins in
1999 and all jobs will be in place by December 31, 2001.	

Americold currently has 0 full-time permanent employees at the project site. In total, Americold has _____ full-time permanent employees in the State of Ohio

The increase in the number of employees will result in approximately (\$683,000) Two Million Four Hundred One Thousand Dollars of additional annual payroll for Heinz. As stated above, all new jobs created will be full-time permanent jobs.

Section 4:

Heinz and Americold shall provide to the proper Tax Incentive Review Council any information reasonably required by the council to evaluate the enterprise's compliance with the agreement, including returns filed pursuant to section 5711.02 of the Ohio Revised code if requested by the council. The companies shall also be required to supply a copy of the Ohio Department of Taxation State Tax return form 913 to the Tax Incentive Review Council for each year the agreement is in effect or required to be reviewed.

Section 5:

The City of Massillon hereby grants Heinz and Americold a tax exemption pursuant to Section 5709.62 for eligible new tangible personal property acquired in conjunction with the Project. This tax exemption shall be at the rate of 75% on all machinery and equipment, as well as increases in inventory over the base level, acquired as part of the Project. Each identified project improvement will receive a ten year exemption period. The exemption commences the first year for which the tangible personal property would first be taxable were that property not exempted from taxation. No exemption shall commence after December 31, 2001 nor extend beyond December 31, 2011.

Section 6:

The City of Massillon hereby grants Heinz and Americold a tax exemption for real property improvements made to the Project Site pursuant to Section 5709.62 of the Ohio Revised Code. This tax exemption shall be at the rate of 75%. Each identified project improvement will receive a ten year exemption period. The exemption commences the first year for which the real property exemption would first be taxable were that property not exempted from taxation. No exemption shall commence after December 31, 2001, nor extend beyond December 31, 2011.

Heinz and/or Americold must file the appropriate tax forms (DTE 23) with the County Auditor and (#913) with the State Department of Taxation to effect and maintain the exemptions covered in the agreement. The #913 Ohio tax form must be filed annually.

Section 7:

Waivers under section 5709.633 of the revised code: not applicable.

Section 8:

Heinz shall pay to the City of Massillon an annual monitoring fee of (\$500) Five Hundred Dollars for each year the agreement is in effect. The fee shall be made payable to the City of Massillon and shall be paid by certified check and delivered to the Mayor by March 31 of each year that the fee is due and payable. This fee shall be deposited in a special fund created for such purpose and shall be used exclusively for the purpose of complying with section 5709.68 of the revised code and by the tax incentive review council created under section 5709.85 of the revised code exclusively for the purposes of performing the duties prescribed under that section.

Section 9:

Heinz and Americold shall pay such real and tangible personal property taxes as are not exempted under this agreement and are charged against such property and shall file all tax reports and returns as required by law. If the companies fails to pay such taxes or file such returns and reports, all incentives granted under this agreement are rescinded beginning with the year for which such taxes are charged or such reports or returns are required to be filed and thereafter.

Section 10:

The City of Massillon shall perform such acts as are reasonably necessary or appropriate to effect, claim, reserve, and maintain exemptions from taxation granted under this Agreement including, without limitation, joining in the execution of all documentation and providing any necessary certificates required in connection with such exemptions.

Section 11:

If for any reason the Enterprise Zone designation expires, the Director of the Ohio Department of Development revokes certification of the zone, or the City of Massillon revokes the designation of the zone, entitlements granted under this agreement shall continue for the number of years specified under this agreement, unless Heinz and/or Americold materially fail to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement and the City of Massillon terminates or modifies the exemptions from taxation under this agreement.

Section 12:

If Heinz and/or Americold materially fail to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement, or if the City of Massillon determines that the certification as to delinquent taxes required by this agreement is fraudulent, the City of Massillon may terminate or modify the exemptions from taxation granted under this Agreement.

Section 13:

Heinz and Americold hereby certify that at the time this agreement is executed, they do not owe any delinquent real or tangible personal property taxes to any taxing authority in the State of Ohio, and do not owe delinquent taxes for which Heinz and/or Americold is liable under Chapter 5733., 5735., 5739., 5741., 5743., 5747., or 5753. of the Revised Code, or, if such delinquent taxes are owed, Heinz and/or Americold currently is paying the delinquent taxes pursuant to an undertaking enforceable by the State of Ohio or an agent or instrumentality thereof, has filed a petition of bankruptcy under 11 U.S.C.A. 101, et seq., or such a petition has been filed against Heinz and/or Americold. For the purposes of the certification, delinquent taxes are taxes that remain unpaid on the latest day prescribed for payment without penalty under the chapter of the Revised code governing payment of those taxes.

Section 14:

Heinz and Americold affirmatively covenants that they do not owe: (1) any delinquent taxes to the State of Ohio or a political subdivision of the State: (2) any moneys to the State or a state agency for the administration or enforcement of any environmental laws of the State; and (3) any other moneys to the State, a state agency or a political subdivision of the State that are past due, whether the amounts owed are being contested in a court of law or not.

By executing this agreement, Heinz and Americold are committing to following non-discriminating hiring practices acknowledging that no individual may be denied employment solely on the basis of race, religion, sex, disability, color, national origin, or ancestry.

Section 17:

Exemptions from taxation granted under this agreement shall be revoked if it is determined that Heinz and/or Americold, any successor enterprise, or any related member (as those terms are defined in Section 5709.61 of the Ohio Revised Code) has violated the prohibition against entering into this agreement under Division (E) of Section 3735.671 or Section 5709.62 of the Ohio Revised Code prior to the time prescribed by that division or either of those sections.

Section 18:

This Agreement is not transferable or assignable without the express, written approval of the City of Massillon.

Section 19:

Heinz and Americold affirmatively covenants that they have made no false statements to the State or local political subdivision in the process of obtaining approval for the Enterprise Zone incentives. If any representative of Heinz and/or Americold have knowingly made a false statement to the State or local political subdivision to obtain the Enterprise Zone incentives, Heinz and/or Americold shall be required to immediately return all benefits received under the Enterprise Zone Agreement pursuant to ORC Section 9.66(C)(2) and shall be ineligible for any future economic development assistance from the State, any state agency, or a political subdivision pursuant ORC 9.66(C)(1). Any persons who provides a false statement to secure economic development assistance may be guilty of falsification, a misdemeanor of the first degree, pursuant ORC 2931.13(D)(1), which is punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 and/or a term of imprisonment of not more than six months.

H.J. Heinz Company, as part of an overall corporate restructuring, has combined Ore-Ida and Weight Watchers Gourmet (Weight Watchers) brand foods into Heinz Frozen Foods Company proposes to establish a "Center of Excellence for Frozen Foods" at the existing Weight Watchers site located at 1301 Oberlin Road SW, Massillon, Ohio 44647-7669. The establishment of the "Center" will involve significant expansion of production and warehouse facilities by Heinz Frozen Foods Company and Americold. Americold, a distributor of frozen foods, will build a new 164,000 square foot warehouse adjacent to the current Weight Watchers site in Massillon.

This expansion of the facility requires the investment of approximately \$126,000,000:

Inventory: \$ 9,083,333 (Heinz)

Warehouse Expansion: \$ 16,000,000 (Americold)

Machinery and Equipment: \$ 1,000,000 (Heinz)

Total: \$ 26,083,333

The expansion will create an additional one hundred and nine (109) permanent full-time jobs, with full benefits, over three years. The new expansion will create additional \$3,084,000 of annual payroll. The breakdown of permanent full-time job and payroll creation between Heinz Frozen Foods and Americold is as follows:

EXHIBIT 2 BUSINESS REASONS FOR REQUESTING TAX ABATEMENT

As detailed previously in Exhibit 1, the establishment of the "Center" would involve significant expansion of production and warehouse facilities by Heinz Frozen Foods Company and Americold. As a result, Heinz Frozen Foods and Americold respectfully request a tax exemption for ten (10) years of seventy-five percent (75%) of tangible personal property first used in business at the project site, located at 1301 Oberlin Road SW, Massillon, Ohio 44647-7669, resulting from this agreement. Furthermore, Americold respectfully requests a tax exemption for ten (10) years of seventy-five percent (75%), of real property constituting the project site located at 1301 Oberlin Road SW, Massillon, Ohio 44647-7669.

Under the proposed restructuring, the two brands will be consolidated into a new "Center of Excellence for Frozen Foods" The new "Center", which will be located within the City of Massillon, will be known as Heinz Frozen Foods. This restructuring will allow Weight Watchers and Ore-Ida brand foods to remain competitive in the industry. Assistance from the City of Massillon will help lower costs allowing Heinz Frozen Foods to maintain and improve its competitive position within the frozen foods market. City assistance will help offset the high initial costs associated with the proposed expansion, thus allowing the new "Center" to be successfully launched.

Financial assistance from the City of Massillon, Ohio is an important component of Heinz Frozen Food's proposed restructuring and expansion. While other Companies in the area have been downsizing, cutting costs and eliminating jobs, Heinz Frozen Foods is increasing their commitment to the community. The planned restructuring will increase capital investment thereby creating and maintaining many new permanent full-time jobs. The benefits the City of Massillon will realize in the future as a result of the current tax abatement agreement will greatly outweigh the partial property tax foregone.

WHEREAS, the City of Massillon, Ohio has found it to be in the City's best interests to accept the services of L & B Entertainment/William Curtin for the purposes of having a summer concert series, said contract is to be in existence from November 1, 1998 and continue in existence through August 30, 1999.

1. Formation and purpose.

Now therefore, the parties hereby for themselves agree to this joint venture for the purposes of performing and completing a summer concert series in the City of Massillon, Ohio, and agree with each other that they will carry on the work under such contract as joint venturers. It is specifically understood and agreed between the parties hereto that this Joint Venture Agreement extends only to the performance of the summer concert series entertainment contract, together with any changes or additions thereto or extra work thereunder, and in no event shall this agreement extend to or cover any other or different work or services.

2. Capital.

The City of Massillon will pay the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) to L & B Entertainment/William Curtin for the services of L & B Entertainment to provide a summer concert series.

3. Interest of parties.

It is agreed that the interests of the parties hereto in and to the performance of the summer concert series entertainment contract, in and to any and all property, materials and equipment necessary for the summer concert series shall be provided for by the City of Massillon to L & B Entertainment and William Curtin.

4. Donations and collections.

All collections at the summer concert series in the City of Massillon, Ohio shall be the sole property of the City of Massillon.

5. General management.

L & B Entertainment shall have the duties of booking, introducing, and coordinating entertainers for the summer concert series. The Eight Thousand Dollar (\$8,000.00) fee is a booking and entertainment fee only. If necessary for any back-up bands or additional performers for the main acts, the City of Massillon shall pay L & B Entertainment, in addition to the Eight Thousand Dollar (\$8,000.00) contract price, for services necessary for back-up bands or additional entertainers. All entertainers and music performers will be paid through the City of Massillon funds.

The City of Massillon will pay the entertainers separately from the services of L & B Entertainment/William Curtin. L & B Entertainment will provide services as stated above.

The City of Massillon, Ohio shall be responsible for the setup, location and tear down of the City's own equipment in regards to providing the summer concert series.

Interpretation.

It is the mutual intention of the parties that this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Ohio as to the execution, authentication, construction, the legal obligations arising under this Agreement, and as to what is to be deemed a performance or satisfaction thereof.

7. Parties bound.

Subject to the foregoing provisions herein contained, this agreement shall inure to the benefit of, and be binding upon the parties hereto, their successors, trustees, assigns, and legal representatives, but shall not inure to the benefit of any other person, firm, or corporation.
